



Utilizing technology to disrupt donation methods - directly matching the needs of the underprivileged with a pool of donors.



Uncle Hung | Gingko House Employee


Uncle Hung is an avid worker, and a man of few words. You will often find him tirelessly filling bowls with food and giving them out, whenever someone tries to thank him or compliment him on his work, Uncle Hung would keep a level head and answer, "It is simply a bliss to be able to offer food to the others. I'm not getting any younger, so I try to give back to the society as long as my body still allows it."

The 71-year-old Uncle Hung was in fact on the receiving end at Gingko House just a year and a half ago. At the time, the Chinese restaurant in which he had worked for 30 years was forced to shutter due to poor business. Looking for a job was no easy matter under the challenging economy, especially for a man of his age. He had no choice but to stay home, idling the days away.

Yet, the friction between Uncle Hung and his wife also grew, "We were both stuck at home and feeling stressed and uneasy." Through the referral of a friend, he later learned about Gingko House and was told that he was eligible for the food programme. So every day, he would commute from his home in Tsing Yi to Yau Ma Tei and receive his meal.

Last October, the genial Uncle Hung, who is always punctual, was invited to work at Gingko House for a few hours every day. Today, he is coordinating the meals and rapid test kits donated through Share for Good. "It doesn't matter how much I earn or what I'm asked to do, I'm happy to be helping out," said Uncle Hung.

A bliss to be able to share food.



I finally bought a tube of shampoo.

Some 20 years ago, Uncle Wong was working as a construction worker at an airport railway project. He and his team were underground working hard to beat a deadline, when all of a sudden, a metal bar came loose and hit him on his head. Following the accident, he would constantly suffer from headaches and feel dizzy. "My headaches were so excruciating that I would bang my head against the wall. I simply couldn't live normally," he added. The accident turned his life completely upside down. "Without work, I had no income. My wife and I soon divorced and my son also left me," Uncle Wong eventually found it impossible to eke out a living in Hong Kong, so he returned home to Zhongshan, living with his relatives and taking odd jobs.

When the pandemic hit the world, Uncle Wong became unemployed in mainland China and he had to return to Hong Kong before his identification documents expired. He did settle at a makeshift flat in Shum Shui Po, but the living conditions were worse than bad. "There were mice and cockroaches, and the roof was constantly leaking. It still cost more than

HK\$2,000 a month," he said. From garbage bins, he picked up used clothes and a mattress and pillow. "What I'm wearing today are actually clothes that people threw away," he added. With a plastic bag, he would visit the wet market, and pick up broken eggs and stale vegetables on the ground. He would then cook them at home. With barely any money to spare he bought a bag of what he would describe as the "most multi-functional item", baking soda. "I used it to shower, wash my hair and do my laundry," he said.

It was not until he found out about the Young Women's Christian Association that he began to see glimpses of hope in life. "They gave me supermarket cash coupons, and they offered me meal vouchers. It was then when I bought my first tube of shampoo," Uncle Wong said, "I wanted to kneel in front of them and thank them." YWCA added that support from many partners, including supermarket voucher donation from Share for Good, means a lot to their beneficiaries.

Choi Wan & Her Daughter | Hong Kong PHAB Association Beneficiary

Choi-wan is Vietnamese Chinese in Hong Kong who taught herself Cantonese by watching online videos. Naturally, Choi-wan speaks with a Vietnamese accent, which ends in a crescendo, so much so that one might think that she is actually delivering good news, "With 10 dollars I would buy four pieces of bread every day, a pineapple bun for breakfast and a cocktail bun for lunch. So 10 dollars can actually last me two days."

What Choi-wan deprives herself of she gives to her daughter. Every day she cooks for her daughter. A normal meal would include rice, chicken, fish and vegetables. And when everyone else works during the day and rests at night, Choi-wan stays up all night to keep a close watch on her daughter's breathing. "I'd look at her eye lids, and listen to her breaths," she said. "If she gets a seizure attack and doesn't wake up after two minutes, I'd have to call the ambulance." It had happened once every few weeks in the past two to three years. Choi-wan had for numerous times carried her daughter Yan-yan to the emergency room in the middle of the night, "All the medics and doctors and nurses at the ER know us well by now."

In the past year, things have gone further south for her family. Choi-wan's husband is an airconditioner technician, but when the employer went missing one day, he had already gone six With 10 do months without getting paid. Earlier this year, when Hong Kong went into a panic buying of medicines and rapid test kits, would bu Choi-wan would repeatedly count the money in her wallet, and walk from one drug store to the next to compare prices. At long last, she decided pieces o to "splurge" on a few rapid test kits, some Panadols, and Vitamin C tablets, "I had no choice but to protect ourselves," she said. "I could really feel the pressure." It was not until Choi-wan every day. received support from the Hong Kong PHAB Association that she could finally breathe a sigh a relief over anti-epidemic supplies.
